ENGLISH

Students who have applied to WCC, who have a Student ID Number and access to their MyWCC student portal can still do the Informed Self Placement for English here.

Students who are having trouble accessing the ISP for English, or who would prefer to work directly with me for English Placement, can use the attached document titled *English Placement Guidance for student*.

- This document provides descriptions of each English Course offered
- Students will simply choose a class and email me (cgreen@whatcom.edu) with that choice and I will enter their placement choice manually

MATH

Because we can no longer host on-campus proctored Math Placement Tests at this time, students can work directly with me to select a Math Placement.

- The philosophy right now is to simplify the process for students, and to provide them with the autonomy to make a good choice.
 - § Students who have applied to WCC, who have a Student ID Number and access to their MyWCC student portal may want to take a PRACTICE ALEKS Math Placement Test independently from home for their own understanding of their math abilities, and how they align with WCC math courses.
 - § Students can also use the attached document titled Math Placement via Transcripts All High Schools to see what course their most recent grade in their most recent math class places them into.
 - § Students can also use the attached document titled Math Course Descriptions to get a sense of what each math class at WCC entails, and make a decision based on that information.
- With one/a combination of the three measure above, students must simply email me (cgreen@whatcom.edu) with their Math Placement choice and I will enter their placement manually
- If students are unsure about what course would be the best fit for them, I can help them use the tools attached to make a strong choice. We can connect via EMAIL, PHONE, or ZOOM

FINANCIAL AID

Financial Aid Appeals - Colleges May Adjust Financial Aid Based on Change in Circumstances

If someone in your family has lost a job or is working less, colleges may be able to provide more financial aid. Colleges may <u>adjust financial aid</u> based on a student's or parent's job loss, reduced income, loss of benefits (like child support), or even extraordinary medical or dental bills. Each situation is different, and colleges' requirements vary, so students should contact the financial aid office to talk about options:

- If you've already filed a 2020-21 FAFSA or WASFA, talk to the financial aid office about your situation.
- If you haven't applied for financial aid, it's not too late. **Submit your application**, then follow up with the college to discuss changes.

Don't let financial aid myths limit your options for the future

Think you can't afford college or career education? Financial aid helps many students pay for education after high school, and more families in Washington are now eligible. Even if you didn't qualify before, you might now!

Myth #1: My parents make too much money, so I won't qualify for financial aid.

Fact: Applying for financial aid is the only way to know for sure whether you qualify. With the new <u>Washington College Grant</u>, an eligible student from a family of four making up to around \$97,000 per year can receive some money for their education.

Myth #2: Financial aid only pays for universities. That takes four years—I need to start working now. Fact: Financial aid can be used for many types of full-time or part-time education, including career and technical schools, community colleges, some apprenticeships, and yes, universities too. You have options!

Myth #3: I can't apply for financial aid, because I don't know what I'm going to do after high school. Fact: You can complete a FAFSA or WASFA financial aid application before applying for college or training. You can make your final choice about whether and where to go later, knowing more about what you can afford.
