Q32 - What was unclear, or how could we improve communication?

It was a little unclear on how it impacts our taxes over time and how do the other bonds add in. I would just like to see the total bond numbers projected out for the next 10 years.

The cost per household appeared to be exorbitant. Your subsequent attempts to say it wasn't provided numbers that still came to very high totals per household. This proportion of expenses on the backs of residents is crazy. The effect of your "clarifying" statement was to make me distrust you and this measure. It appeared you were trying to deceive voters.

Consider when requesting a bond issue that assessed property values increased 20-25% for many this year. In addition, two other bond requests from the community. While information notified me of the proposal, it did little for me to reconcile significant increases in property taxes that I had already incurred.

Highlight what cuts you already made to your budget then put forth the case as to why additional money is required beyond cuts already implemented

How about more cost comparisons, I don't think a 500K home is even a possible price to find anymore. More details on actual work, seems to replace a few poles with lights is a million dollar plus job. Early on it seemed there was tennis courts, artificial turf, etc. what other things are hidden in this presentation?

What was unclear was that there was no explanation on the current bonds and why you were asking for more. Didn't you recently pass a technology bond yet your schools are using 5 different apps and teachers are using multiple digital tools for class work and expecting kids to remember them all. Pick one. Or hire leadership who will pick one and get all staff on board. It just is inefficient, if your district can't figure out one app to use, how will the school build go? We also don't believe you need a new school. Declining birth rates, many families opting for distance education, it doesn't make sense. Maybe reassess in 10 years after you've figured out your inability to streamline technology. Also the football field. Really? How many students does a football field benefit? That was a want, not a need, and it came off greedy, since football only benefits a select few. That's why we voted no.

By not asking for more money for the schools.

More transparency about exactly what the bond is funding. All I heard about was the new middle school, and I never heard anything about the high school upgrades.

More bullet points to summarize the narrative.

Info timing; too long between mailings.

No easy info on community members involved to be able to chat or ask questions - peer to peer (i.e. facilities committee, advisory groups, campaign folks.).

No overall info (or not clear) on if any existing bonds maturing or not.

No info on costs to get bond financing.

Info meetings at the District were at inconvenient times, & not enough notice.

Ashame....Middle School replacement is such a critical need.

It seems that the middle school is below expectations for reading and math. I think we should focus on reading comprehension especially with a focus in being able to tell what is fact versus opinion, and how to check if things are true.

I am a retired elementary school Principal with 32 years of experience. In my opinion, you are simply asking for too much from a small pool of tax payers. With a lot of planning, I would think that you could remodel the middle school for a lot less money and still serve the needs of that small number of students. The bond issue read like a wish list to accomplish very few needs.

\$70.92 million for one new school is too much.

I would advise the school board members and anyone who put the levy together to evaluate the economy we are in right now. I want them to put themselves in other people shoes who do not make an absorbent amount of money. This levy would raise property taxes astronomically. We are still paying for the new high school levy and I believe the other previous levy. The middle school needs to be done affordably and should have been the only thing proposed. The levy was unreasonable to ask of the community members with the state of the economy.

Partial middle school redo. Make repairs to some of the existing?

Not really improvement, but super curious if there's a way to get feedback from people who said no. Who? Why? I really don't think any of the proposed projects should go, but I also think that removing a small part might be a nod to the financial hesistancy from the first ask, while also affirming that these things are needs, not wants. Especially the MS and poles. That said...I wonder if presidential election anxiety had anything to do with it. I wonder if Trump getting elected (in part on the premise that more money will be in people's pockets) will swing a few no voters to yes if they have less perceived financial uncertainty now. (That said - I worry that his tariff plans may make expenses go up, so perhaps acting now is the move rather than waiting a year or two.)

Another idea: can we find some yes voters who are not alums, don't have kids in school, won't have kids or grandkids in district (I suspect many of the folks voting no are in this category, though I have zero data on this, just rationally) and get some of them to film some content on why they said yes. Like maybe it's appealing to some of those voters to see themselves represented in the campaign.

I know the amazing team did door to door knocking at the apartments in the Cordata area. If there was a special ballot in Feb, could there be a ballot party with food and childcare/entertainment provided and people fill out ballots there? (Those are voters who don't pay taxes in district if they're renting and also probably a lot of families with kids.)

Can similar events be held at other community events/venues?

Can we mobilize our recent grads who are likely to be registered but perhaps live out of area? Find our last 5 years of class or ASB presidents and have them reach out to their classes and make sure those ballots are mailed to them if they're away at college? I know it's a small number but big movements are the accumulation of lots of small movement.

Since you're requesting a very large bond at a time of high inflation and tax rates, you should cut some of the spending from the bond for the school. It's a middle school...present three options to the community and see which one they choose.

Allow all district access to homeschooled facilities. This facility is a cost the school district should not spend when it's not equally shared by all in the school community. The home schooled students should be using the school facilities as part of their curriculum, they should not be allowed to spend public money for their private use. If your asking taxpayers to give more money, first trim egregious spending.

Breakdown of costs for the middle school bond and more transparency in who bid on the project, what the bids were, where the money is allocated, etc. This information needs to be dispensed to voters who are unable to attend meetings so we can make a knowledgeable decision. An accountability for where all the additional COVID money went would also be nice as it seems difficult to agree to this high cost without accountability for those additional funds.

I feel like the whole truth is not being told these things do not add up to me it seems shady!! I could go on and on but I better stop!!

I think the community is generally at its spending limit. My suggestion is for you to work on the council if you hope to get a bond passed.

Context: we are a district transfer family into Meridian.

Can you imagine a way you begin backing away from early elementary technology access (given the dirth of evidence about negative impacts to kids' eyes and brains from tech normalization and proliferation) to free-up the funds maintaining Chromebooks, tablets and the Google suite accounts for at least patching funding holes or for saving toward real, brick and mortar amenities and safety improvements? Everything on the bond makes a lot of sense as indisputably beneficial for the well-being of the students. Research would argue to the contrary with the technology curriculum available to kindergarten, 1st, 2nd and 3rd graders. I hope you will be able to access grant funding for a generator. I know they are out there.

As much as some students would benefit from the opportunity to have subject acceleration, having 5th graders moved to a campus with older peers is less than ideal. Developmentally there is a huge jump from 5th grade to 8th grade. The bus ride is also an unstructured time that brings concerns with that wide of an age gap.

We are heartbroken that the bond failed-we have two young children who would have directly benefited from the new MMS. A neighbor who voted no told me that he was just not able to justify the bond's impact to his property tax (he's near retirement with adult children, upper middle class) but can understand how our family was supportive. We got into countless disagreements over the bond's positive impact on the COMMUNITY as a whole (not just school age kids!) and if he wants Whatcom County to thrive, investing in our kids is one way to do it. Perhaps reaching out a little more to those folks who are older and without school-age kids currently in the district would help. My husband adds that he feels the bond was just too expensive to pass during this tumultuous election year. We both wish WA state would contribute more to the bond, however we both work in education (he at WCC, me in early childhood ed) so we fully understand the issues and difficulty behind that wish. We fully support another push for the bond!

As a senior and long time property owner I have had my property taxes more than double. This is a budget buster for us, so I will not vote for any more projects than increase our already high taxes.

You must not change the bond issues. Both the facility and the bond amount.

You should get the Whatcom County Council Representatives from our district to support and endorse the bonds. Also the state representatives from our district. Maybe coffee clatches of voters to get people interested in voting.

I have been a property owner in the Meridian School District for over thirty years. I believe that the property taxes in this district are among the highest levy rates In Whatcom County. As much as I want to see the district thrive, I am finding it extremely difficult to be able to afford the tax burden. Perhaps, instead of an all at once proposal, a more budget conscious extended phase implementation would allow the taxpayer to stomach the increase tax burden. As Meridian School Administration, you must be mindful of the financial burden these budgetary improvements place on the relatively small population of the Meridian district. Simply put, we just cannot afford this proposal.

Hope the school district will run it again, just with the middle school.

Our kids are long out of school, we're retired, own our home, and live on a fixed income. Since there's no income tax in Washington, property taxes pay for a disproportionate share of everything and are correspondingly high. I'm sure many people voted against the bonds due this financial concern, it's not inconceivable that older people might eventually be priced out of their homes. A more equitable way to pay for essential services (such as education) has to be found.

Education is critical to success in life for almost everyone, there are exceptions and they are rare. My wife and I got great educations in public school as did our kids, the current generation deserves it too.

Voted against because the amount being spent on football stadium was not clear in voter guide, or previous literature. Did not want to give a blank check to athletes.

I voted for the bond, but my husband didn't. We don't have children but we religiously read the newsletters because education of our community is important to us. But it's hard to understand why you chose the priorities you did on such an expensive project when it seemed the needs across bond initiative projects were uneven priority.

If I lived in the district I would have voted for this bond but we're just outside the district and have transferred out of Ferndale district for my son to attend IRE.

Our currently way too high and it feels like we will be taxed out of our home. We will not vote for anything that raises are taxes.

The combined dollar value of the overall bond projects is much too high. In order for the bond measure to potentially pass in a future election cycle, it would be advisable to drop the New Meridian Middle School project, so that the total cost to taxpayers is reasonable.

As a parent of a recent graduate, I was glad to see ALL of these being planned for, and was hopeful for the bonds to pass. I'm hoping that something can be done in the future.

Unhappy with the overzealous spending in the district and without regard to the excessive property taxes we are currently facing. Lifetime resident. Alumni. First time voting NO.

Pay off existing debt before asking for more money. I understand that repairs and replacements are needed, I get it. But our district has stretched us to the point of having to choose if we want to eat or build new schools, the bleeding of money has to stop.

Hopefully there will not be an added expense of resubmitting it to the voters, as we have already voiced our say by defeating the bond.

I will always support schools, and I am happy to pay for it.

On a personal note, our family has been so disappointed with the education that we attempted to access through Meridian School District. We were a part of MP3 for several years, and I need to state that the staff in that school are fantastic. It was a positive learning experience for a number of years. We had to leave the program when my daughter fell behind approximately 1.5 years in standard learning markers.

When our other child attempted to go to MHS, she experienced good teaching in just two classes. Unfortunately, she experienced a teacher who came to school drunk, and another who showed R rated movies during class time- on a regular basis. Another teacher gave my daughter failing grades for two weeks straight in all of her assignments. She is normally an A student. Yes, we did bring it to the school's attention, but nothing was done in a timeframe to help us. I understand all teachers are no longer employed with Meridian. Most disappointing to our family was when we approached the school to ask for help with what we suspected was a mild form of dyslexia for same child. We were refused help and told to go to our pediatrician. We left Meridian at that point, so very disappointed. We turned to full time homeschool and both children are successful college students today. This personal information is shared so you can understand that while we are very much pro- education, we can't get behind this increase that will most definitely affect our budget and ability to pay for our children's health and welfare, and college.

Additionally, the dollar amount that Meridian asked for is out of place and unrealistic with the local economy and wages in this area. Our family is already burdened enough by our local school property taxes. Please be better stewards of the money that you already receive. Budget better. Go for grants. Don't burden us any further.

At one time in the past, I was contacted by a student at Meridian to ask for voting for the bond issue. I think personal contact with all Meridian voters would help. Educational needs are the basis for a democratic society.

Support education and the funding of it.

A facilities committee should consist solely of individuals who currently make their living directly in construction. They are most qualified to spot out waste and understand current and future market conditions. The political step of including a broader spectrum of the district community to review and make recommendations to the school board would be separate and occur after the facilities committee completed their work.

All the projects proposed are worthy of financial support.

I think the bond was not approved because people are being squeezed from all angles financially. Meridian school district has gone way down hill in terms of education quality in the elementary school, thus families are opting to educate their kids in other ways or move their kids to other districts/states. Inclusivity has gone way to far, and the majority of kids are not suffering as a consequence.

I feel like the way that the bond was presented made it sound like the school was saying it would cost people less money, which is true per \$1000 assessed value, but not true in overall amount of money that would be paid annually. I think one major concern I heard in the community was the idea that 5th graders would be moved to the middle school if the bond passed. This may seem like a secondary issue but I believe it actually alarmed people enough to vote against the entire bond. It may be best to reconsider this as it distracts voters from the primary issue/needs of a new MS and HS repairs.

People are upset about the forced curriculum, CRT and WOKE Parents are opting for private education.

You don't need tontax the people of the community so much money.

I didn't like the "fear" element that dominated the discussions about the bond. Things like, "Our kids aren't safe," "The building is crumbling around them," "Learning cannot take place in this environment." Our school district has built two brand new buildings in about 10 years, and the district is asking for another brand new building. While we all understand that the middle school is old, it is a HUGE ask and burden on the tax payers. The economy is terrible, and our state continues to make it worse. Cost of everything is up and our taxes have doubled in the past 5 years. I'm frustrated with the lack of financial responsibility of the district. I don't think the money is being used responsibly. Our schools are overcrowded and yet we are still letting in kids from out of district.

Regarding the bond for the middle school: Clear costs to tax paying home owners in the school district were not outlined in any publications. The math on the ballot was very daunting and we were not financially able to make that commitment.

With people unable to afford rising property taxes, especially increased number of retirees in the district, probably should present the case in a way that makes it sound worth it. I voted for it, but some of the language was not clear enough about the importance and necessity. The "stadium" updates sounded frivolous and extensive, for example. (When people are having a hard time making ends meet, not the best time to ask for new stadium lights...) Highlighting the safety issues of the middle school building would make more sense, and focusing on just that. Only necessity, especially in this economic climate.

Please keep the 5th grade at the elementary school.

I think you probably had a lot of people who wouldn't normally bother to vote in a smaller election voting because it was a presidential election. I would guess that people who only vote in presidential elections don't pay as much attention to the needs of their community and if it doesn't benefit them in a measurable way they would vote no. Our house voted yes and will vote yes again next time.

Living costs are high, and people only have a little spare money right now. The increasing taxes is another thing property owners in the district have to worry about. I suggest getting back to brass tacks. People want their children to learn reading, writing, and math. No less, no more. The push to include many controversial things in the school curriculum is a sore subject in our community. I have been told firsthand that people are speaking with their money. If they are discontent with things being pushed on their children in school, they aren't going to want to approve bonds funding it further. Many feel they aren't being listened to and that minority groups of students are taking precedence over the general population. I think the district should look at the bigger picture. People are telling you how they feel about how things are going with their vote.

Do to the current economic situation nationally, I believe that passing a much smaller bond for an "update" to the current MMS building would be best. The current building, while old, is still a decent school. Modern ADA entrances and bathrooms would make a world of difference. The school building still has a lot of life left in it.

I cannot support putting 5th graders in a middle school setting. Developers should be supporting the cost of constructing the new middle school and/or building an elementary school capable of withstanding the growth they create.

Utilize community zoom meetings? More neighborhood canvassing?

The middle school absolutely needs to be rebuilt but it is not appropriate to move the 5th graders to the MS in order to address overcrowding. The district continues to allow out of district students to attend Meridian schools which contributes to the overcrowding. If you move the 5th graders will you stop letting out of district students to attend IRE? If not you really aren't solving any problems. With property taxes skyrocketing over the last year and a potential increase coming again it is difficult to support the bond. It just seems like we are supporting so many out of district kids. I am happy to support our district just not everyone else.

You should've waited on the levy that was passed recently because I believe this is more important. But voting YES for everything gets really expensive for us tax payers living in the district.

Future efforts should include easing the crowding of IRE

I would have voted yes if I was in the Meridian District!

I won't vote for approving a bond when it includes items that should be covered under standard maintenance/repairs. I'd also like to see the public presented with three options for choosing the new school project and not an \$85 million only option. Schools are turning into architecturally appealing campuses and it's running the costs up so high over aesthetics, it's turning people away. Look at your community, they're mostly farmers and middle class blue collar. We aren't seeking an impressive and state of the art, we're seeking practical and functional. The \$85 million offer was a wish list denied by the community. Go back, sharpen your pencil and approach the community with something more reasonable and in line with standard and average square footage prices.

While these are important, many families are struggling and cannot sustain higher property taxes, and rent (if renters). Increased property taxes will up rent. I have to wonder if there's ways to lower the bond costs and meet families in the middle more. I wonder if the lack of living wage jobs, and high cost of living is affecting the vote on this even if people want to support it.

Housing prices have skyrocketed in the past few years, which means property taxes have also skyrocketed in the past few years. I have no doubt that the community understands the need for a new middle school, but I think people just felt that they can not afford it right now. I think we should focus on keeping the cost as low as possible (don't try to pack a bunch of stuff into one bond) and make sure the financial impact is clear to the voters.

Thanks for trying to identify why the bond issue didnt get 60%; and ways to meet the important needs of our District.

Hope things can be sorted quickly enough to go back to voters with a revised proposal in early 2025.

The school district has a lot of older generations voting. I think next time spreading awareness and having honest conversations would help a lot with their votes. Many I spoke with were concerned about cost to them, so maybe informing them about tax programs they qualify for to relieve property tax burden would help garner their support.

I think we need to figure out more ways to get the community into the middle school. I don't know what that looks like but they have to see what the building looks like.

If we are going to move the 5th grade over either way I think that might be good messaging to put out there.

Advertise and make it very clear where to find the area to vote yes. I sub as secretary at IRE and several parents mentioned to me that they did not see it on their ballot. If it was easy to see on the ballot, maybe they live out of district.

The middle school needs to be replaced. Do not try and add all of these additional items. You are asking property owners to pay a great deal of taxes as it is. Plus we just renewed a technology bond a few months ago, which impacts our taxes.

Most of my neighbors voted no because they can't afford more money right now. They tell me it's food and housing or bond. Unfortunately the times are bad for a lot of families.

I understand it is difficult to compare this to residential pricing, but all amounts seem absurdly high. I voted "no" even though I would like to see all these projects completed because of the cost.

It's a huge addition to our taxes.

The Bond needs to striped to just the middle school. This bond will not pass with multiple items on the docket. Community members saw this as too big of an ask with multiple items needing money. The safety concerns at the middle school with the building need to be addressed first and foremost.

I think you will have a couple of problems. 1) families whose kids will not attend the new middle school are probably less likely to vote for it; because it doesn't do anything for them. 2) the way you handled the whole is beyond forgivable.
